

Hints and Tips - Starting a Reading Group

Ice-breakers for first meeting:

- What does reading for pleasure mean to you?
- Where do you read at home? In the bath, in bed or somewhere else?
- Do you read fiction, which genres? Do you read non-fiction?
- Do you read a few books at a time or just one?
- Can you imagine what the characters look like?
- Do you choose a book from its cover?
- Do you read what someone has recommended?
- Do you use internet sites like Amazon, Fantastic Fiction to choose your next read, do you use the library catalogue?
- Do you have an ereader?
- Do you use Overdrive to download library eBooks?
- Do you prefer seeing the film adaption before or after you've read the book?

How to choose what to read as a group

Use the library Service's extensive collection of multiple copy reading group titles (Groups should make first, second and third choices as many of the titles are in demand) We also welcome recommendations for additions to the collection

Use Amazon to find out more about the titles and to get ideas for future reads

Recommendations from group members, reviews in newspapers, magazines, websites, radio and television.

NewBooks Magazine in your local library is a great source of inspiration and is now associated with online resource



Websites for Readers

<u>www.lovereading.co.uk</u> – helps you to decide what to read next. There are also free extracts of books so you can try before you decide what to read. You can choose from the list of categories – debut novels, biography, relationship tales and family drama etc. A very comprehensive site.

<u>www.whichbook.net</u> – a fun site which allows you to input your mood and taste – happy or sad, easy or demanding, conventional or weird. It will then recommend titles, graded as best match or good match. A direct link to Prism (library online catalogue) is available so that your chosen title can be reserved.

<u>www.readinggroups.org</u> – Reading Groups for Everyone - run by the Reading Agency, this site gives tips about running a group, discounts and promotions, awards and shortlists and news from reading groups – groups can register their details here and be part of a national network.
